["Redefining AIDS in Asia: Crafting an Effective Response"](#) UNAIDS, March 2008, 258 pages. What are the driving factors behind the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Asia and how many of these change? What are the best strategies for overcoming the epidemic? And are those strategies viable and realistic in Asia today? The report assesses the impact of AIDS in Asia, refines the understanding of Asia's pandemic, and pinpoints the critical components of a viable and sustainable long-term response to combat AIDS in Asia.

["Preventing HIV with Young People: The Key to Tackling the Epidemic"](#) UNICEF, June 2009, 32 pages. Aspects of life that reduce the ability to avoid HIV infection together with the absence of protective factors has increased young people's vulnerability and likelihood of engaging in behavior that compounds their risk of HIV infection. This report examines the current situation of the HIV epidemic with respect to youth, looking at the key challenges faced by adolescents and young people.

["Behavior Change and HIV Prevention: \(Re\)Considerations for the 21st Century"](#) Global HIV Prevention Working Group, August 2008, 26 pages. The report examines evidence of behavioral HIV prevention as a means of identifying what is known and not known about

generating and sustaining behavior change. It explores the elements of successful behavioral initiatives, the limitations of current approaches, key outstanding questions, and research needed to strengthen the evidence base for behavioral change.

[“Investing to Meet the Scientific Challenges of HIV/AIDS”](#) Anthony S. Fauci and Gregory K. Folkers. *Health Affairs*, November/December 2009, 13 pages. The authors discuss the serious scientific challenges remaining in the realm of developing potentially curative therapies for HIV/AIDS, focusing on why substantial funding for research enterprise must be maintained.
